Our "Missions" Near and Far

It used to be when we talked of "missions" and "Missionaries" we were speaking of people who dedicated their lives to bringing the gospel to others in far-off lands. Sometimes they would come back and visit their sponsoring congregations every 5-7 years, requesting ongoing support and sharing what they were doing so far away. I remember a room in my home church, growing up, with a display case with a spear, some tribal artifacts, and the cape of an impala antelope, from our sponsored missionary in Africa (Kenya, I think).

Now we recognize that may be a rather limited view of "mission work." Africa is sending missionaries to the United States to work with African immigrant Christian populations. And we have started to realize that "mission work" can happen much closer to home, because in the 21st century, the world seems a smaller place. The needs seem so great and varied, but our responses are growing greater and more varied, too. Over the next 2 months we want to consider how Glenwood Lutheran has been "Stepping Up In Mission" with the world. Some of these missions happen within our doors, some happen to our community, and some happen far beyond Pope County and the State of Minnesota.

Our goal is to help you understand how your support—your money, your valuable time, your talents and skills, your prayers and attention—make ministry and mission possible from Glenwood Lutheran Church to the world and invite you to be a deeper part of them! Each week, we will highlight one important, exciting and impactful way we are in mission; we want to show you how "stepping up to mission" is a "step into the God's Kingdom."

Who Benefits from Giving?

Life is strange. Consider this: in a 2008 paper published in *Science*, three investigators gave study participants money, asking half to spend it on themselves, and the other half to give it to some person or charity. Those who donated the money showed a significant uptick in happiness; those who spent it on themselves did not. Other academic work has shown that offering aid to others can actually make you healthier—lowering blood pressure, stress, illness, and mortality.

A 2014 book by two Notre Dame social scientists, called

The Paradox of Generosity: Giving We Receive, Grasping We Lose, combines national surveys with in-depth interview and group observations. It concluded that "the more generous Americans are, the more happiness, health, and purpose in life they enjoy. This association...is strong and highly consistent.... Generous practices actually create enhanced personal well-being. The association...is not accidental, spurious, or an artifact of reverse causal influence." These researchers conclude with a simple observation: "People often say that we increase the love we have by giving it away." In this, they write, "generosity is like love."

Even people who have very little money are eager to give and feel good when they do. According to The Almanac of American Philanthropy, among households with annual income under \$25,000, close to four out of ten still give charity to others in a typical year. The beneficial effects of generosity are apparently not income dependent.

Even though we often act sinfully selfish, God has still created in us a basic need to meaningfully connect with the world and with others through generosity and giving. In our ministry together, let us help you find a way toward meaning and health in your life through giving in all its forms. And let us help you to finally give your life over to Jesus Christ, the one who first claimed you.

From the Heart of Pastor Krista

"Then Jesus called the twelve together and gave them power and authority over all demons and to cure diseases and he sent them out to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal. He said to them, "Take nothing for your journey, no staff, nor bag, nor bread, nor money – not even an extra tunic. Whatever house you enter, stay there, and leave from there. Wherever they do not welcome you, as you are leaving that town shake the dust off your feet as a testimony against them. They departed and went through the villages, bringing the good news and curing diseases everywhere." Luke 9:1-6

We are a transactional society. Everything has a price tag, or so we believe. Going into a situation most of us want to know what we will get out of it, or what price we have to pay. A transactional economy depends on quid pro quo. This should not come as a surprise to any of us.

What surprises us is when we begin talking about the church and Jesus and try to interpret both through the lens of transaction.

In the Lutheran tradition, barter does not work. We cannot and do not interpret Jesus Christ through the lens of a deal or business matter because Jesus Christ is not transactional. Or, if you want to argue that he is, then you have to consider that Jesus is the only one who ever had to pay a price for salvation. He gave all and received nothing in return. That is not the definition of a transaction. Lutherans would call it the Great Exchange; where Jesus took our place on the cross and died so that we do not have to, but even in the Great Exchange there is no transaction on our part.

In the Luke text quote above, Jesus sends out his disciples and does not give instructions about exchanging money or how much a healing would cost or what much casting out demons would bring into his ministry. He sends them OUT and tells them to "take nothing for your journey."

How freeing it must have been to go out into the world and not be burdened with the constant worry of how to pay for things or how much to ask in payment. What if we took baby steps to live into the freedom God has given to us in Jesus Christ. The freedom to be without expectation of any return or acquisition. Good news?

A Snapshot of our Finances

Thanks for your ongoing support of our ministry here at Glenwood Lutheran Church! Your continued generosity makes our mission concrete and visible in our building and in our community. As of October 1, our ministry received \$41,009 of gifts and income (including restricted giving) during the month of September, for a total of \$172,398 for May-September year-to-date. This is against a budgeted year-to-date income of \$216,852. On the expense side, we have incurred \$44,684 of expense during the month of September, for a total of \$197,453 for May-September year-to-date. Our budgeted year-to-date expense is \$233,276.
